Two La Joya ISD educators finalists for \$5,000 award

ATPE to announce Educator of the Year awards in July

THE VALLEY, Texas — The Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE) is proud to announce that two La Joya ISD employees are finalists for one of five ATPE Educator of the Year awards.

Dalia Aleman, an eighth-grade teacher at Memorial Middle School, is a finalist for ATPE's Secondary Teacher of the Year award and Hilda Martinez, a substitute teacher for Trevino Middle School, is a finalist for Associate of the Year.

"ATPE is proud to have members who are committed to furthering public education," Executive Director Gary Godsey said. "Regardless of who wins this year, both finalists have done an outstanding job and have shown their dedication to Texas schoolchildren."

The ATPE Educator of the Year Awards acknowledges ATPE members who demonstrate exceptional or innovative capabilities in their respective education fields. Five recipients will be awarded \$5,000 at this year's ATPE Summit Awards Banquet held at the Austin Convention Center.

The Educator of the Year Awards are divided into five categories:

- Administrator of the Year
- Associate of the Year
- Elementary Teacher of the Year
- Secondary Teacher of the Year
- Special Services Educator of the Year

A committee composed of ATPE members reviews all applications and selects up to three finalists for each category. The winners will be named following interviews with each finalist in July.
